FAMILY - CARCHARHINIDAE - Requiem Sharks (Continued)

Tiger Shark (Galeocerdo cuvier)

Perhaps the best known of the requiem sharks is the tiger shark. It is a large, fearsome, scavenging fish with a deservedly bad reputation. It lives in warm and tropical seas around the world. Small specimens have tigerlike stripes on their back and sides, but these become faint with age.

It is a voracious feeder, attacking almost anything that moves. it is so indiscriminate in its diet that it gobbles indigestibles as readily as digestibles. Stomachs from these sharks have revealed an astonishing variety of items from cans and boots to bags of coal and parts of human bodies. It is often nicknamed the 'qarbage can shark'.

There are at least 27 documented attacks on humans.

2. 1940 opens quietly in France, but hostilities intensify at sea.

The British military response to the declaration of war is immediate, advance army units of the British Expeditionary Force (BEF) arriving in France on 4 September, the main force disembarking at Cherbourg six days later. Further reinforcements follow and by May 1940 the British Army in France numbers 394,165.




Endless nights of sentry duty on the French border results in 99% boredom, 1% fright.



This photograph shows the entire shore whaling station, with the flensing platform, huge whale oil tanks and hundreds of casks of oil ready to ship out.


Grytviken on South Georgia became the capital of the southern whaling fleets. This sub-Antarctic island 800 miles cast of the Falklands on the same latitude as Cape Horn, was once a thriving whaling station that lasted two-thirds of a century almost entirely fuelled by British finance.

Matthias Corvinus, known as "The Raven King" after the raven that adorned his coat of arms, seized the Hungarian throne in 1458 and spent much of his life fighting the Hapsburgs. As well as a warrior he was a great patron of the arts, and the last five years of his life were spent amassing a magnificent library which aimed to assemble all the knowledge of the ancient world.



Most British seaside towns had local censorship committees that approved or rejected 'risky' postcards. Blackpool was the 1st in November 1951. During 1954 the British authorities tried to clampdown on risky postcards, although Bamforth said in a court case in 1954 that his postcards were vulgar not obscene. The jury agreed with him. In the 1960s attitudes started to change and in 1968 the Blackpool committee closed and the last committee to close was the Isle of Man in 1985.

In my experience there is hardly time to write a letter on the way down!



The BTA holds three competitions each year. All are 16 sheets:

- 1. BTA Cup for Thematic Philately

The BTA has two or three meetings a year, often joint with another society. Every two years we have a weekend event covering many aspects of Pictorial collecting.

Confident of not being challenged Hitler now looks to Germany's eastern borders. Following British and French acquiescence to his demands at Munich Hitler's troops occupy the Sudetenland, the German speaking area of Czechoslovakia, on 1 October 1938. They march into the remainder of the country on 15 March 1939.

The annexation of the Sudetenland is given visual expression on a German postal stationery card.

On 1 September 1939 Hitler invades Poland. Using a manufactured dispute over Danzig as a pretext, German forces cross the border into Poland at 04.30 hours unleashing a blitzkrieg assault that totally overwhelms the Polish defenders.





By concentrating tanks and mechanised infantry on a narrow front, closely supported by ground attack aircraft, the tactic of blitzkrieg enables German forces to decisively punch through Polish defensive lines

In a radio broadcast to the British people Chamberlain declares war against Germany on 3 September 1939, Hitler having ignored Britain's ultimatum demanding the withdrawal of German forces from Poland







Despite the Poles courageous defence of their country German tactics and superior military hardware renders it an unequal struggle. Poland surrenders on 27 September, its capital in ruins.

2. Treasures from the rock

2.5 and in parts of South America

Diamonds were discovered in 1725 in Brazil, by miners from Portugal. They called the area Diamantina, Portuguese for diamonds. This mine started the Brazilian Diamond Rush of 1725-1860, and also helped revitalise the diamond trade in Europe, as the Indian diamond mines were becoming depleted, after 2000 years of use. Geologically the mine is the oldest diamond deposit in Brazil. Prior to this, the gold miners had, unknowingly, used diamonds as chips on the gaming tables!





A similar hand-stamp on the 1st Brazilian stamp, known as the Bull's Eye due to the pattern formed in setenant pairs

1848 Pre-stamp cover with V. Diamantina hand stamp Brazil, then a Portuguese colony, supplied most of the diamonds for Europe from 1725-1870, as Portugal had claim to the country and would not allow others to mine there. The cliffs at Diamantina, where the diamond mines were situated, are now a National Park. Later hand-stamps were without the 'V'

THE TRAVELLER'S TREE


(Ravenala madagascariensis)



The Traveller's Tree is often called the "Traveller's Palm" but, botanically, is not a palm at all. It is a member of the Strelitziaceae family and related to the "Bird of Paradise" plants. Its botanical name, Ravenala madagascariensis, emphasises the fact that this beautiful and unusual plant originated on the island of Madagascar. It is a native of Madagascar's lowland forests.

The Traveller's Tree can grow up to 30 or 40 feet in height. Its large, broad leaves grow from the central stem and spread out to create a fan-like display. Each leaf has a sheath at its base in which water collects. It is this supply of water which gives the plant the name "Traveller's Tree". It is a true 'exotic' and is now grown in botanical gardens, private gardens and landscaped areas throughout the world's tropical regions.

PALACE HOTEL, SAN FRANCISCO, USA

ITEM 1. 1926 Advertising Envelope for the Palace Hotel, San Francisco sent to Washington, Penn. with 1922 2 cents George Washington stamp and slogan postmark "Air Mail saves time".



The Palace Hotel is a landmark historic hotel in San Francisco, California, also referred to as the "New" Palace Hotel to distinguish it from the original 1875 Palace Hotel, which had been demolished after being gutted by the fire caused by the 1906 San Francisco earthquake. The present structure opened on December 19, 1909 on the site of its razed predecessor. The hotel was closed in 1989 for two years to undergo a renovation and seismic retrofit.

ITEM 2. 1910 postcard of the Palace Hotel sent to Bristol, UK with 1908 1 cent Benjamin Franklin stamp. (plus various postal markings)

This 1910 postcard was sent four months after the hotel was rebuilt. It reads "... San Francisco is building up (good?), pretty soon all traces of the fires and earthquake will entirely
disappear. The New Palace Hotel, recently opened, is not as high or a picturesque outside as the old one. But
the interior is grand and the building one of the grandest in the city..."

Mrs Kissock Goes Shopping (But what did she buy?)

On 17th January 1910, Mrs Maria Kissock shopped at the Army and Navy Co-operative Society store and spent £30. Who was Mrs Kissock and what could she have bought for £30?

Mrs Maria Kissock was a widow in 1910 aged 80. She was living in affluent Kensington Gardens with her daughter, 2 year old grandson and son-in-law who was a surgeon and Captain in the Life Guards together with two handmaids and two nurses. Mrs Kissock seems to have spent some time abroad as her daughter was born in Tasmania

House Kensington Gardens.

She died in 1911 only 3 months after her purchase.

What could Mrs Kissock have bought?

A pair of silver candelabra £30

A sable fur stole £25

A gent's gold watch £29

A lady's gold watch set £29 with pearls and diamonds

The Army and Navy Cooperative Society Ltd was
incorporated in 1871, being
formed by a group of army and
navy officers. The aim was to
supply goods to its members
at the lowest remunerative
rates. The store expanded
rapidly at home and in other
countries over the next 35
years offering a wide range of
goods and services. They also
had an enormous illustrated
price list which could be
ordered by phone.

The advent of the First World War saw trade suffer badly, and it was hit hard during the Second World War too with some stores suffering serious bomb damage.

A CHESS GAME THAT NEVER TOOK PLACE

At the start of the American Civil War, a large number of patriotic covers were produced and used by supporters of the Union side. These two show an imaginary chess game played between a confident looking General Winfield Scott, the Commander in Chief of the Union forces at the start of the conflict, and an unhappy looking Jefferson Davis, the President of the Confederate States. Both covers probably date from 1861, as the war started in April 1861, and General Scott was dismissed by President Lincoln in November 1861. It is unlikely that the covers would have been used after that.
