The C.T.C. was the first Touring Club in the world and joined the Alliance Internationale de Tourism in 1918.



The Bicycle Touring Club was formed at Harrogate on 5 August 1878; amended to Cyclists' Touring Club 1883.

#### 4.2 TRACK RACING

One of the oldest and most specialized forms of cycle sport. Tracks open air on concrete or grass, indoor on wood.



Union Vélocipédique Française (UVF) controlled racing from 1881. One of the earliest French cycle postmarks.

2 or 3 riders contest sprint races over 1,000 metres; tactics all important

### 4.2 TRACK RACING - The Pursuit.

Two individuals, or two teams of 4, start at opposite sides of the track; race over 4kms or 5kms.



Hugh Porter went on to win 4th World Pursuit title. Metermark B & T (Bannel) Ltd., Hawick, Scotland.





Stadiums for track racing are known as velodromes; some are open air and others are enclosed.

## 4.3 ROAD RACING

National and International races held all over the world and a Road Race held in each Olympic Games.



U.C.I. (Union Cycliste Internationale) is the governing body of World cycle racing.

## 4.3 ROAD RACING - Massed Start

A road race usually exceeds 100 miles, stage races spread over several days and may exceed 1,000 miles.

Cycle Racing popular before Motor Racing

First PARIS-ROUBAIX race held 19 April 1896, known as 'Hell of the North' because of the cobblestones. At end rode 6 laps of Roubaix track.

### 4.3 ROAD RACING - Time Trials

Form of unpaced racing against the clock for a set distance of 10, 25, 50 or 100miles or 12 or 24 hours, in U.K.







Riders start at one minute intervals

and may carry a stop-watch

Must not ride in slipstream if overtaken







Rider overtaken tries to keep competitor in sight, but may see him riding further and further and further away until out of sight



## 4.4 CYCLO-CROSS

Began as off-season, off road, activity for riders to keep fit during the winter; but then became competitive.



Laps of about 2 miles, riding fast on grass slopes and tarmac but carrying bikes through mud streams and much more.
