



4.6 STAGE RACES - Giro d'Italia

The second most important. Stage Race began in 1909; usually held in May, 2 months before the Tour de France.

4.6 STAGE RACES - East European Peace Race

The first race was held over a route from Warsaw to Prague and back to Warsaw, winner Zoric Yugoslavia





Polish currency was revalued in September 1950 and some stamps overprinted with new currency "Groxzy".

2nd race, 1 - 9 May 1949, over 8 stages from Warsaw to Prague.



4.6 STAGE RACES - Tour de France

Henri Desgranges remained as "Directeur de la Course" from 1903 into the 1920s and maintained tough rules.





For many years riders carried spare tyres around neck. Had to change own tyres if punctured

Race leader wears yellow jersey with initials "HD" on left breast L'Auto printed on yellow paper

From the start there was always a Team Race winner.

In 1923 that was Auto - Moto and the winner of the race was French - Henri Pelissier

Henri Desgranges responsible for the publicity caravan ahead of riders.

4.6 STAGE RACES - Tour de France

Eddy Merckx and Miguel Indurain had won the Tour 5 times but in 2004 Lance Armstrong won for the 6th time.

4.6 STAGE RACES - Tour de France

The most famous cycle race in the world and a major French sporting event; held over 3 weeks in July each year.



Maurice Garin was winner of the first Tour in 1903.

First Tour organised by Henri Desgranges.

He was Editor of L'Auto and a racing cyclist.



The Tour always ends in Paris along the Champs Elysées.

4.6 STAGE RACES - Tour de France

Known as "La Grande Boucle" (The Big Loop), race clockwise around France, and sometimes into adjoining countries, one year, and anti-clockwise the following year



The field breaks down into smaller groups, when the mountains are reached

The leading rider, in the "King of the Mountains" wears red polka dot jersey



Tours dogged by drug scandals, despite tough action taken against riders who test positive for drugs.

Points awarded to leading riders for each stage. Leader on points wears green jersey.
